Swing bed program reopens Monday

DENNISON - Twin City Hospital at Dennison will reopen its popular Skilled Rehabilitation/Swing Bed Program on Monday.

The swing bed program is designed for patients recovering from hip or knee replacement surgeries and back surgeries. The program focuses on short and long-term goals to help patients regain and improve their level of mobility after surgery.

"We are very pleased to be able to reopen this program," said Frank Swinehart, interim chief executive officer for the hospital. "It is a very popular program that allows patients to recover from surgery in a comfortable, stress-free atmosphere where all of their needs are taken care of by our qualified, friendly staff.'

Twin City Hospital's rehabilitation team includes a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant, occupational therapist, occupational therapist assistant and a dietitian.

The patient is seen by physical therapy staff twice each day and by an occupational therapy staff member and dietitian once daily to promote a quicker return to home and resume regular activities. Therapists work on goals to allow patients to care for themselves, decrease pain

and increase their ability to move.

With up to 10 beds, the program is the only one of its kind in a Tuscarawas County hospital, although some nursing homes offer such services.

The average length of stay for a swing bed patient at Twin City Hospital is six days, but can be up to 20 days. The program most commonly provides care for patients facing debilitation, post hip

replacement, post knee replacement, long-term intravenous therapy and back surgery rehabilitation. Those interested should talk with the discharge planner at the facility where their surgery is performed and request the program.

Most insurance providers are accepted.
